AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES PREVENTION FOR FISHING TOURNAMENTS

As states implement and enforce regulations pertaining to aquatic invasive species (AIS) transport, it is more important than ever to take action to prevent the spread of AIS. Be sure your tournament protects the waters and educates others to do the same. Along with inspection and removal, a boat-wash station is the best protection.

Community Opportunities

AIS Inspections

Local fishing clubs, scout troops or other organizations can help by performing watercraft inspections in advance of the official tournament start.

Boat-Wash Events

Boat-wash events create opportunities for both fundraising and education. Once the tournament begins, the pre-launch inspection lines are the ideal place to quickly inspect boats for AIS, and the weigh-in offers time for visual inspection, draining and washing.

Record Keeping

Keep a record of plans and actions taken for each event to ensure consistency and demonstrate that your tournament or club is dedicated to AIS prevention.

Prepare a check sheet to be used at each event that includes:

- 📃 event name
- date and location
- AIS prevention steps

These records will show that your event is complying with AIS transport regulations as well as taking steps to protect our water and preserve fishing traditions for generations to come.

A boat-wash station is the most effective way to prevent AIS.

Even the most basic steps can provide significant protection from the spread of AIS between waters. It only takes a little training, so check out our resources on the back of this brochure.
